Visit Kinneil Museum


Kinneil Museum, in front of Kinneil House, is open all year, normally Mondays to Saturdays from 12.30 p.m. to 4 p.m. (plus House Open Days). Features interactive exhibits, audio visual show and shop. Admission free.

You can view the exterior of Kinneil House - and tour the grounds - all year. See inside Kinneil House during our free open days. Organised by Historic Scotland with the support of The Friends of Kinneil (Charity Registration Number: SC038368) and Falkirk Community Trust (Charity Registration Number: SC042403). Last admission to Kinneil House is normally 30 minutes before closing. Kinneil Estate is on the western edge of Bo'ness in central Scotland, just off the A904/A993 and is part of the Frontiers of The Roman Empire World Heritage Site. 




Discover 2000 years of history in the magical Kinneil Estate, on the western edge of Bo'ness, near Edinburgh. The name Kinneil means "Wall's End" - and the eastern end of the turf and stone Antonine Wall, the Roman Empire's northern frontier, runs through the estate. There's even a Roman fortlet to visit (pictured above).

For centuries Kinneil was the home of the Dukes of Hamilton. Their imposing former mansion, Kinneil House, dates back to the 15th century and features impressive Renaissance wall paintings, said to be among the finest in Scotland. See inside during free open days. The surrounding park features the remains of Kinneil's Medieval church and graveyard, dating back to the 12th century. You can also visit the cottage where inventor James Watt worked to develop an improved steam engine. Plus there are extensive woodland walks to enjoy.

The story of the estate and much more is told in Kinneil Museum, open throughout the year, normally Monday to Saturday from 12.30 pm to 4 pm (plus Kinneil open days). Admission is free. For more information call the Museum on 01506 778530.





Inside Kinneil House



Kinneil Estate is on the western edge of Bo'ness in central Scotland, just off the A904/A993, and is part of the Frontiers of The Roman Empire World Heritage Site.
